BUTTERNUT & BLUE CIVIL WAR CHALLENGE

Here are the guidelines for this year's quilt show challenge. The goal is to create a personal memento of the American Civil War in this its sesquicentennial year.

The palette is butternut (light gold to deep warm brown) and blue (medium indigo to deep navy, almost black). Red and/or white may be added. Your entry can be any design, appliquéd or pieced, or a combination. The range of dimensions is $10'' \times 10''$ to $30'' \times 30''$, and need not be square. The design must have a Civil War connection assigned to it, i.e. a person, event, battle, etc. A brief description (1 or 2 sentences) should be submitted with your entry and will be posted with it at the show.



CTQG LIBRARY NOW FEATURES BOOKS BY SUE NICKELS

The library now has all five books which Sue Nickels has authored; a brief description of each book is outlined below. The books were acquired in anticipation of Sue's visit to the guild in May and are now available for guild members to "check out."

As background, Sue has been quilting for 31 years, starting by hand and gradually focusing on machine work. She has been teaching

machine techniques for the past 20 years. Sue co-authored three of the five books with her sister, Pat Holly. Pat is also an award-winning quilter. One of her specialties is miniature appliqué quilts. Sue and Pat have also collaborated on several quilts which have gone on to win awards from major national quilt shows. Two of their best known quilts are "The Beatles Quilt," the 1998 AQS Best of Show, and "The Space Quilt," winner of the 2003 IQA Master of Machine Artistry Award and the 2004 AQS Machine Workmanship Award.

<u>Machine Quilting: A Primer of Techniques</u>, by Sue Nickels, covers all aspects of beginning machine quilting and provides everything you need to know to get started.

<u>Machine Appliqué: A Sampler of Techniques</u>, by Sue Nickels, provides clear and concise instruction on invisible, template and starch, and raw-edge fusible machine appliqué. This book is out of print and hard to find. The CTQG library is fortunate to have this book in its holdings.

<u>Stitched Raw Edge Appliqué</u>, by Sue Nickels and Pat Holly, is filled with great tips, ideas, illustrations, and wonderfully creative projects for raw-edge appliqué.

<u>60 Machine Quilting Patterns</u>, by Sue Nickels and Pat Holly, provides a collection of 60 patterns, specifically designed to make machine quilting quick and easy. Patterns include traditional feather designs, florals, and geometrics. Although designed with the machine quilter in mind, hand quilters can also use the patterns.

<u>Amish Patterns for Machine Quilting</u>, by Sue Nickels and Pat Holly, features 83 traditional hand-quilted Amish designs which are easy to use for both machine quilting and hand quilting. The designs include flowers, feathers, cables, baskets, stars and more and can be easily adapted in size and shape.

Quilt Bingo

Materials for 1, 10½ inch block (your bingo card)

Choose fabric from the following categories:

	5 5	
Batik	Star	Polka Dot
Floral	Striped	Plaid
Heart	Geometric	Solid
Paisley	Novelty	1930's Print
Leaf	Holiday	Metallic (somewhere in fabric)

All squares are $2\frac{1}{2}$ inch squares, with a $\frac{1}{4}$ inch seam allowance.

5 squares assorted blue patterns / solid

5 squares assorted yellow and orange patterns / solid

5 squares assorted green patterns / solid

5 squares assorted red patterns / solid

4 squares assorted pink and purple patterns / solid

1 square black for the center (free spot)

For each color, select 5 (4 for pink/purple) different patterns / solid. You can repeat the patterns in several different colors if you like.

Block Assembly

- 1. Join 5 greens from the list to make the first row. In the same manner, make the blue, red, and yellow/orange row.
- 2. Join 2 pink/purple squares twice so you have two pairs. Join one pink/purple pair on each side of the black square to complete the pink/purple row.
- 3. Join rows, placing them side by side vertically in this order: Green, Blue, Pink/Purple, Red, Yellow/Orange.
- 4. Bring buttons for Bingo Chips.

Don't repeat a pattern in any column, but feel free to use the same pattern in as many different colors as you want!

We will have a basket with prizes for the winners. We are asking everyone to bring one fat quarter to put in the basket. If you would like to donate other small items or patterns, they would be much appreciated.

Make more than one block if you would like, they will be collected at the end for making Sunshine quilts. You will be allowed to play 4 blocks at a time. Share the others with friends!
