# The President's Block

Hi fellow quilters,

It was so nice to see everyone in person and visit and share all the wonderful works of art! I got inspired and started a couple of projects myself.

I am still working on a program for the May meeting so stay tuned...We also need programs for June, July and August, so if you would like to present some technique or interesting program please let me know. A few members were interested in having a demo on the rugs using jelly rolls and I know there are a few members who have made them. Would someone like to take on that program? It would be much appreciated!

We need a nominating committee formed in May. It is normally three but there could be one or two members to take on the responsibility of finding members to be officers and committee members. They would then present the slate of officers at the June meeting. We would then vote on those positions and the new officers would take charge after the August meeting. The elected positions are: President; Vice President, Secretary; and Treasurer. - Better to buy more fabric than you think you need for a quilt, rather than too little, as this allows room for mistakes, shrinkage or making a sample block, and for building your stash.
- When designing patterns for your quilt, don't forget you can use everyday items to draw around. Plates, cups and saucers and even cookie cutters all make great templates.
- Always bring the bobbin thread to the top of the quilt before beginning to sew so you can avoid any tangling on the back.
- If possible, lay your batting out flat for a couple of days to allow it to relax before you

quilt it so you don't get caught with wrinkles or creases.

- Everyone has UFOs (Unfinished Projects). Make the effort to go through them and decide what you do actually want to finish, then you can cull the rest and either give them to friends or charity, or sell them.
- Ensure your binding goes on smoothly by running a row of stitching around the edge of the quilt to hold all three layers together, before you attach it.
- For exercise, keep your ironing board well away from your machine and get in the habit of getting up to press every seam as you sew.

# **Recipe Corner**

#### **RHUBARB CRISP**

# 6 tablespoons cold butter, cut into small pieces

- 2<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> to 3 pounds rhubarb, trimmed, tough strings removed, cut into 1<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>-inch pieces (about 5-6 cups)
- <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup white sugar
- 1 tablespoon orange or lemon juice
- 1 teaspoon orange or lemon zest
- <sup>3</sup>⁄<sub>4</sub> cup brown sugar
- 1/2 cup all-purpose flour
- 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon, or to taste
- Pinch salt
- $\frac{1}{2}$  cup rolled oats
- $\frac{1}{2}$  cup pecans

Heat oven to 375 degrees. Grease an 8- or 9-inch square baking or gratin dish with a little butter. Toss rhubarb with white sugar, orange or lemon juice and zest, and spread in baking dish.

Put the 6 tablespoons butter in a food processor along with brown sugar, flour, cinnamon and salt, and pulse for about 20 or 30 seconds, until it looks like small peas and just begins to clump together. Add oats and pecans and pulse just a few times to combine.

Crumble the topping over rhubarb and bake until golden and beginning to brown, 45 to 50 minutes.

#### **RHUBARB SCONES**

1¼ cups whole wheat pastry flour 1¼ cups all-purpose flour ½ cup sugar

- 1 tablespoon baking powder
- 1 teaspoon ground cardamom
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> cup cold unsalted butter, cubed
- 1½ cups finely chopped fresh or frozen rhubarb,
- thawed (3-4 stalks)
- $^{1\!\!/_{\!\!2}}$  cup heavy whipping cream
- 1/4 cup fat-free milk
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- Coarse sugar

Preheat oven to 400°. In a large bowl, whisk the first 6 ingredients. Cut in butter until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Add rhubarb; toss to coat.

In another bowl, whisk cream, milk and vanilla; stir into crumb mixture just until moistened.

Turn onto a floured surface; knead gently 4-5 times. Divide dough in half; pat into two 6-in. circles. Cut each into 8 wedges. Place wedges on parchment-lined baking sheets; sprinkle with coarse sugar. Bake 18-22 minutes or until golden brown. Serve warm.

#### SLOW COOKED STRAWBERRY RHUBARB SAUCE

6 cups rhubarb, chopped into ½-inch pieces 1 cup sugar ½ teaspoon grated orange zest ½ teaspoon ground ginger 1 cinnamon stick (3 inches) ½ cup white grape juice 2 cups halved, unsweetened strawberries Angel food cake, pound cake or vanilla ice cream

Place rhubarb in a 3-qt. slow cooker. Combine sugar, orange zest and ginger; sprinkle over rhubarb. Add cinnamon stick and grape juice. Cover and cook on low for 5-6 hours or until rhubarb is tender.

Stir in strawberries; cook 1 hour longer. Discard cinnamon stick. Serve with cake or ice cream.

#### **RHUBARB RELISH**

12 cups finely chopped fresh or frozen rhubarb

- 1 medium onion, chopped
- 2 cups sugar
- 1 cup cider vinegar
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon ground cloves
- 1 teaspoon ground allspice
- 1/4 teaspoon paprika
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon

Rinse four 2-cup freezer containers and lids with boiling water. Dry thoroughly.

In a large saucepan, combine all ingredients. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat and simmer until mixture thickens, about 2 hours, stirring occasionally.

• Fill all containers to within ½ inch of tops. Wipe off top edges of containers; cover with lids. Refrigerate up to 3 weeks or freeze extra containers up to 12 months. Thaw frozen relish in refrigerator before serving.

MORE QUILT TIPS

- Make your quilt rod / hanging sleeve from a patchwork of all the fabric used in your quilt. Then, if you need to repair anything on the quilt top later, you will have a selection of the right fabrics to use.
- When doing stitch-in-the-ditch machine quilting, stitch as close to the seam as possible, so that your quilting stitch remains largely invisible.
- Do not prewash your fabric when piecing miniature quilts, as the sizing in the fabric will help make it easier to piece.
- Be careful to press seams that meet in opposite directions so as to reduce the bulkiness, and allow more accurate machine piecing.
- To piece together two curved patches (like a Drunkards Path block), it is easier to sew with the convex (outer) curved patch on the top.
- Using spray starch on the backing of your quilt is a popular trick to help the quilt move more easily through your machine when quilting by machine.
- For smoother sewing or pinning, run the needle through your hair to oil the metal a bit.
