


### QUILT DEFINITIONS

- Album Quilt: A quilt in which each block is different.
- Amish Quilt: A quilt style originating in the Amish communities of Eastern Pennsylvania and the Midwest. These quilts are usually made from dark, solid colors with ample use of black as a background and simple geometric patterns with wide borders. Use binder clips to keep fabric pieces organized.
- Backing: The back or bottom layer of the quilt.
- Crazy Quilt: Fancy patchwork, from irregular and often scrap pieces, with no set pattern or design overall. Most often used with silks, velvets and embroidery; usually constructed on a muslin foundation fabric and embellished with embroidery.
- Directional Prints: Fabrics printed with distinct up-and-down motifs.



### MORE QUILT DEFINITIONS

- Fat Eighth: A fat quarter split into either 11" x 18" piece or 9" x 22" piece.
- Finger Pressing: A technique for making seam allowances lie flat by pinching fabric between your fingers to form a temporary crease.
- Finished Size: The measurement or dimensions of a completed block or quilt without seam allowances.
- Fussy Cut: Center a design on fabric within a shape.
- Invisible Thread: Fine nylon thread used for machine appliqué.
- **Medallion Quilt**: A quilt with a central motif as the focal point, surrounded by multiple borders.
- Miniature Quilt: A small-scale reproduction of a full-size quilt which is 24" x 24" or smaller.
- Muslin: A plain, undyed cotton fabric, available bleached or unbleached.
- Novelty Print: A fabric printed with small whimsical designs, often for a holiday or for craft use.
- On Point: Quilt turned so the blocks are turned at a 45-degree angle.
- Reverse Appliqué: Cutting, turning under, and blind-stitching a top layer of fabric to reveal a shape created by exposing the under layer of fabric.
- Sampler Quilt: A quilt constructed of a collection of blocks in different patterns, usually with no pattern repeated. Blocks may be the uniform or varying sizes.
- Sashing: The fabric that separates the blocks,

- framing them and making the quilt larger.
- Setting: The arrangement of completed blocks forming the quilt top. Blocks can be set side by side, or on point with or without sashing.
- Selvage (or selvedge): The woven edges of the fabric.
- Stack and Whack: This is a technique that instructs you to stack several layers of fabric from the same piece. When sewn together this gives a kaleidoscope effect.
- Stippling: Tiny meandering, continuous motion, used around appliqué or other areas you wish to have a raised appearance. Usually less than  $\frac{1}{4}$ " spacing between stippling lines.
- Trapunto: Dimensional, raised areas in the quilting design. Additional batting is used behind these areas.

# Recipe Corner

July 2023

### PEACH COBBLER

½ cup butter, melted

1 can (151/4 ounces) sliced peaches, drained

11/4 cups sugar, divided

1 cup all-purpose flour

2 teaspoons baking powder

1/4 teaspoon salt

1 cup 2% milk

Whipped cream, optional

Preheat oven to 400°. Pour butter into a shallow 2-qt. baking dish; set aside. Drain peaches, reserving ¼ cup juice. In a saucepan, bring peaches and reserved ¼ cup juice just to a boil.

Meanwhile, in a bowl, combine 1 cup sugar, flour, baking powder and salt. Stir in milk; mix well. Pour over butter in baking dish. Spoon hot peaches over batter. Sprinkle with remaining ½ cup sugar.

Bake until bubbly and golden, 20-25 minutes. Serve warm and, if desired, with whipped cream.

### PEACH BLUEBERRY PIE

1 cup sugar

⅓ cup all-purpose flour

½ teaspoon ground cinnamon

1/2 teaspoon ground all spice

3 cups sliced peeled fresh peaches

1 cup fresh or frozen unsweetened blueberries

Dough for double-crust pie

1 tablespoon butter

1 tablespoon 2% milk

Cinnamon sugar

In a large bowl, combine sugar, flour, cinnamon and allspice. Add peaches and blueberries; toss to coat.

Preheat oven to 400°. On a lightly floured surface, roll half of dough to a %-in.-thick circle; transfer to a 9-in. pie plate. Trim even with rim. Add filling; dot with butter.

Roll remaining dough to a 1/2-in.-thick circle; cut into 1/2-in.-wide strips. Arrange over filling in a lattice pattern. Trim and seal strips to edge of bottom crust; flute edge. Brush lattice strips with milk; sprinkle with cinnamon sugar.

Bake until crust is golden brown and filling is bubbly, 40-45 minutes. Cool on a wire rack.

#### SLOW-COOKER PEACH CRUMBLE

1 tablespoon butter, softened

6 large ripe peaches, peeled and sliced (about 6 cups)

2 tablespoons light brown sugar

1 tablespoon lemon juice

1 tablespoon vanilla extract

2 tablespoons coconut rum, optional topping:

1 cup all-purpose flour

3/4 cup packed light brown sugar

1-1/2 teaspoons baking powder

1 teaspoon ground cinnamon

1/2 teaspoon baking soda

1/8 teaspoon salt

1 cup old-fashioned oats

6 tablespoons cold butter, cubed

Whipped cream, optional

Grease a 6-qt. oval slow cooker with 1 tablespoon softened butter. Toss peaches with brown sugar, lemon juice, vanilla and, if desired, rum; spread evenly in slow cooker.

Whisk together first 6 topping ingredients; stir in oats. Cut in butter until crumbly; sprinkle over peaches. Cook, covered, on low until peaches are tender, 3-4 hours. If desired, serve with whipped cream.

#### CAROLINA PEACH SANGRIA

1 (750-milliliter) bottle rosé wine

3/4 cup vodka\*

½ cup peach nectar

6 tablespoons thawed frozen lemonade concentrate

2 tablespoons sugar

1 pound ripe peaches, peeled and sliced


1 (6-oz.) package fresh raspberries\*\*

2 cups club soda, chilled

Combine first 5 ingredients in a pitcher; stir until sugar is dissolved. Stir in peaches and raspberries. Cover and chill 8 hours. Stir in chilled club soda just before serving.

\*Peach-flavored vodka may be substituted. Omit peach nectar.

\*\*1 cup frozen raspberries may be substituted.


