


QUILT TIPS

- Buy coloring books and use stencils for walls as ideas for applique projects.
- Old aluminum foil cardboard tubes work well to hold binding fabric.
- A magnetic wand can be used to sweep the floors for pins.
- Attach leftover batting to the Swiffer broom (or other dust mop) and use to collect loose threads from the floor.
- Make up brushes and pipe cleaners work well to clean out the hard-to-reach bobbin area in your sewing machine.
- Tape a brown paper bag to the table to catch threads while you're sewing.
- Use a sink scrubby to clean your cutting mats.
- Use empty square Kleenex boxes for trash next to your sewing machine.
- A T-Square is $2\frac{1}{2}$ inches wide and is great for cutting strips.
- Put blue painters tape across ruler when cutting so as not to lose marking while cutting. It comes off easily when you're done.
- A picnic utensil holder works well for storing gadgets.
- Use a manicure stick for a stiletto or point turning.
- Dinner plates are a great template to make the curved corners on a baby quilt or on fleece blankets.
- A flannel backed table cover works well as a design wall.

- To get a distant view of your quilt in a small space before sewing blocks together, use binoculars backwards, or the peephole from a door.
- When you cut several blocks at one time, you can keep track of them by placing the block pieces for each on their own paper plate. They stack and can go to quilt class and stay together.
- Use parchment paper when doing fusible projects. It will keep the iron goo-free.
- In beauty supply stores they sell small plastic disposable razors wrapped with wire used to groom eyebrows. It's a terrific seam ripper.
- Hang quilt blocks on skirt/pants hangers.

- A mouse pad or rubber shelf mat under your machine's foot pedal will keep it from sliding.
- Cut threads with kids' scissors so you aren't as likely to cut your project by accident.
- Hang your small scissors from a lanyard to keep from losing them. They'll always be at hand when you need to snip a thread.
- A large daily medicine dispenser or a threering binder designed to hold baseball cards can be used to store your sewing needles.
- A tool bag with multiple compartments or a toolbox is far cheaper than any similar carrying devices made for quilters.
- An armchair remote pocket can be used to hold pens, rotary cutters, seam ripper, etc.

Recipe Corner

FROSTED CHERRY DROPS



- 1 package white cake mix
- ¹/₂ cup sour cream
- 3 tablespoons cherry juice or water
- ¼ teaspoon almond extract
- 1 egg
- ½ cup finely chopped maraschino cherries

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. In a large bowl, combine cake mix, sour cream, cherry juice (or water), almond extract and egg; stir until well blended. Fold in cherries. Drop by teaspoonful 2 inches apart, onto ungreased cookie sheet. Bake for 8 to 12 minutes, or until edges are light golden brown. Cool 1 minute; remove from cookie sheets. After cooling, frost cookies with cherry frosting (recipe below); top with ¼ of a maraschino cherry.

Cherry Frosting:

2½ cups powdered sugar
¼ cup margarine, soft
1 tablespoon cherry juice
3 tablespoons half and half
Maraschino cherries

Combine all frosting ingredients except the maraschino cherries in small bowl. Add enough half and half for desired consistency. Frost cooled cookies. Top with $\frac{1}{4}$ cherry.

CHOCOLATE MINT COOKIES

- 2 ²/₃ cups all-purpose flour
- ½ teaspoon baking soda
- ¼ teaspoon salt
- ½ cup unsweetened cocoa powder
- ¾ cup light brown sugar, packed
- ²/₃ cup white sugar
 1 cup salted butter, softened

- 3 large eggs
- 1 teaspoon pure peppermint extract
- 1³/₄ cups (10 oz.) mint chocolate chips

- 12-oz. box Junior Mints

Preheat oven to 300 degree F. In a medium bowl, combine flour, soda, salt and cocoa powder. Mix well with a wire whisk and set aside. In a large bowl, blend sugars with an electric mixer at medium speed. Add butter and beat to form a grainy paste. Scrape sides of bowl, then add eggs and peppermint extract. Beat at medium speed until light and fluffy. Add the flour mixture and chocolate chips, and blend at low speed just until combined. Do not overmix.

Drop dough by rounded tablespoonful onto ungreased cookie sheets, 1½ inches apart. Bake for 19-21 minutes. Immediately transfer cookies with a spatula to a cool, flat surface and garnish with a Junior Mint.

PEANUT BUTTER FUDGE



- 4 cups granulated sugar
- ¹/₂ cup margarine or butter
- 1 cup milk
- 12 oz. jar peanut butter
- 7 oz. jar marshmallow crème
- 1 cup flour
- Pinch of salt
- ¹/₂ cup chopped nuts (optional)

Mix together sugar, butter, and milk in saucepan. Heat over medium heat until boiling; boil for 5 minutes. Add peanut butter and marshmallow crème; mix well. Add flour and salt; beat well. Pour into buttered 13x9-inch pan. Refrigerate for easier cutting. This is soft fudge.


