PRIORITIZING UFOS

By American Quilter's Society December 19, 2022

- Start with a list.
 - o Dig in the closets and empty out the drawers. Locate all those UFOs from years ago to yesterday.
 - o Grab a pad and pen, or use our handy worksheet, and write them all down.
 - o Go one-by-one through your UFOs and ask a few questions.
 - Do I really want to finish this project? You have permission to say NO. If the answer is no, scrap it for parts, give it away, or turn it into something different.
 - Do I have everything I need to start this project today? If not, make a note of what's missing and add it the project container with the rest of the project.
- Sort projects by time, technique, and desire.
 - o Time How long will it take to finish the project? Sort projects into two categories: Long Term meaning more than a month and Fast Finishes meaning a day or two. There will be some projects that fall in the middle.
 - Technique Is it a hand project? Is it a machine project? Does it require lots of careful work or is it pretty straight forward? Think about the types of projects you like to do and aim for variety. For example, a pieced project that can travel is great to always have going for those unexpected times when waiting is required.
 - Desire Look at your list of UFOs and put hearts beside the ones you love. Now put more hearts beside the
 projects you feel are important for you to finish. Finally, add more hearts to the projects that inspire you! In
 the end you will have some projects with lots of hearts and others with none.



Recipe Corner

CHERRY COLA CAKE

21/4 cups miniature marshmallows

 $3\ cups\ all$ -purpose flour

3 cups sugar

1½ teaspoons baking soda

1½ cups butter, cubed

1½ cups cherry-flavored cola

4 tablespoons baking cocoa

3 large eggs, room temperature

34 cup buttermilk

1½ teaspoons vanilla extract

For frosting:

1½ cups butter, softened

2 cups confectioners' sugar

2 jars (7 ounces each) marshmallow creme

4 tablespoons frozen cherry-pomegranate concentrate, thawed

Fresh sweet cherries with stems

Preheat oven to 350°. Line bottoms of 3 greased 9-in. round baking pans with parchment; grease paper. Divide marshmallows among pans.

In a large bowl, whisk flour, sugar and baking soda. In a small saucepan, combine butter, cola and cocoa; bring just to a boil, stirring occasionally. Add to flour mixture, stirring just until moistened.

In a small bowl, whisk eggs, buttermilk and vanilla until blended; add to flour mixture, whisking constantly. Pour into prepared pans, dividing batter evenly. (Marshmallows will float to the top.)

Bake 25-30 minutes or until a toothpick inserted in center comes out clean. Cool in pans 10 minutes before removing to wire racks; remove paper. Cool completely.

For frosting:

In a small bowl, beat butter and confectioners' sugar until smooth. Beat in marshmallow creme and juice concentrate on low speed just until combined; increase to high and beat until smooth.

Place 1 cake layer on a serving plate; spread top with 1 cup frosting. Repeat with second layer. Top with remaining cake layer; spread with remaining frosting. Decorate with cherries.

CHERRY-ALMOND STREUSEL TART

Pastry for single-crust pie (9 inches)

⅔ cup sugar

3 tablespoons cornstarch

Dash salt

4 cups fresh or frozen pitted tart cherries, thawed

¼ teaspoon almond extract

For topping:

1/4 cup quick-cooking oats

3 tablespoons all-purpose flour

2 tablespoons brown sugar

1 tablespoon slivered almonds

2 tablespoons cold butter

Press pastry onto the bottom and up the sides of an ungreased 9-in. fluted tart pan with removable bottom; trim edges.

In a large saucepan, combine the sugar, cornstarch and salt. Stir in cherries; bring to a boil over medium heat, stirring constantly. Cook and stir for 1-2 minutes or until thickened. Remove from the heat; stir in extract. Pour into crust.

For topping, combine the oats, flour, brown sugar and almonds. Cut in butter until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Sprinkle over filling. Bake at 350° for 30-35 minutes or until topping is golden brown. Cool on a wire rack.

CHOCOLATE CHIP CHERRY BARS

½ cup unsalted butter, melted (1 stick)

1 cup light brown sugar, packed

1 large egg

2 teaspoons vanilla extract

1 cup all-purpose flour

½ teaspoon salt, optional

34 to 1 cup semi-sweet chocolate chips

1 cup cherries, fresh or frozen

Preheat oven to 350F. Line an 8-by-8-inch pan with aluminum foil, spray with cooking spray; set aside.

In a medium microwave-safe bowl, melt the butter, about 60 seconds. Add brown sugar and stir to combine. Add the egg, vanilla, and stir to combine. Add the flour, salt, and stir until just combined, taking care not to over mix or the blondies will be tough.


Fold in chocolate chips and cherries; pour batter into prepared pan, smoothing it lightly with a spatula or offset knife if necessary.

Bake for 27 to 32 minutes, or until edges begin to slightly pull away from sides of pan and center is set. Allow bars to cool for at least 1 hour before slicing and serving. Blondies can be stored in an airtight container at room temperature or in the refrigerator for up to 1 week or frozen for up to 3 months.




Quilt of Valor Block

Colors: Red, white and blue




PATTERN: LOG CABIN Pattern from www.qovf.org

USES FOR BATTING SCRAPS

- Rough cut a 9 x 12 rectangle to use in your Swiffer;
 you can turn it over and use the other side too!
- Cut into 5" squares to use to make coasters
- Use small odd shaped pieces to dust with.
- Use a small piece of batting at your sewing table or longarm to collect loose threads.
- Have another one at the ironing station to collect threads that you trim off while ironing.
- Use them to pretest thread tension settings by sandwiching pieces between muslin trimmings, cutting them into squares of 6-10 inches and moving the sandwich around under the needle as the machine runs in constant or manual mode.
- Wipe your sewing machine down with them! Cut cotton batting into small squares and keep a stack next to your machine to collect thread snips, and an easy grab to wipe down oil leaks.
- Make small quilts for use in front of your coffee pot or other places where you get drips!
