Twelve members participated in the workshop held at Sterling Center last month and 30 charity quilts have been finished. We now have on hand 41 charity quilts. Prizes will be given out for helping with charity quilts. \$400 worth of fabric was donated for charity quilts.

Old Business:

A small number of changes to the By Laws will be sent out to members. The rest of the raffle tickets for the 2013 Quilt Show were passed out. Volunteers for the Quilt Show are still needed on several committees.

New Business:

After a lot of investigative work it has been decided that we will rent the People's Academy Gym for the Quilt Show. The cost will be \$350.00. Admission for the show was set at \$2.00 per person. There will be a bucket for donations for charity quilts.

The guild is looking into buying liability insurance.

Mary Dick asked if any members might be interested in making a quilt for the Congregational Church of Morrisville.

11 members shared their work. Millie Piper won the drawing.


Program:


Andrea and Marion traveled to the International Quilt Show in Houston and presented a slide show on the many and varied quilts that were on display.

Quilt Show News



