- Making a block of the month (1 entry no matter how many blocks you make)



# **Recipe Corner**

### CLASSIC CABBAGE ROLLS

1 medium head cabbage

1-1/2 cups chopped onion, divided

1 tablespoon butter

 $2\ {\rm cans}\ (14\mathchar`-1/2\ {\rm ounces}\ {\rm each})$  Italian stewed tomatoes

4 garlic cloves, minced

2 tablespoons brown sugar

1-1/2 teaspoons salt, divided

1 cup cooked rice

1/4 cup ketchup

2 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce

1/4 teaspoon pepper

1 pound lean ground beef (90% lean)

1/4 pound bulk Italian sausage

In a Dutch oven, cook cabbage in boiling water for 10 minutes or until outer leaves are tender; drain. Rinse in cold water; drain. Remove 8 large outer leaves (refrigerate remaining cabbage for another use); set aside.

In a large saucepan, sauté 1 cup onion in butter until tender. Add the tomatoes, garlic, brown sugar and 1/2 teaspoon salt. Simmer for 15 minutes, stirring occasionally.

Meanwhile, in a large bowl, combine the rice, ketchup, Worcestershire sauce, pepper and remaining onion and salt. Crumble beef and sausage over mixture and mix well.

Remove thick vein from cabbage leaves for easier rolling. Place about 1/2 cup meat mixture on each leaf; fold in sides. Starting at an unfolded edge, roll up leaf to completely enclose filling. Place seam side down in a skillet. Top with the sauce.

Cover and cook over medium-low heat for 1 hour. Add V8 juice if desired. Reduce heat to low; cook 20 minutes longer or until rolls are heated through and a thermometer inserted in the filling reads 160°.

### PISTACHIO CAKE WITH FROSTING

1 (18.25 ounce) package white cake mix

<sup>3</sup>⁄<sub>4</sub> cup vegetable oil

1 cup lemon-lime flavored carbonated beverage 3 eggs

2 (3 ounce) packages instant pistachio pudding mix

2 (1.3 ounce) envelopes whipped topping mix

1<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> cups milk

Beat cake mix, oil, soda, eggs, and first package of pudding until smooth. Pour batter into a greased 9x13-inch pan.

Bake at 325°F for 45 minutes, or cake tests done.

Beat Dream Whip, milk, and pudding until stiff; pour over cooled cake. Refrigerate.

### GUINNESS, WHISKEY & IRISH CREAM CUPCAKES For the cupcakes:

1 cup (230 ml) Guinness stout
1 cup (227 g) unsalted butter, at room temperature
<sup>3</sup>⁄<sub>4</sub> cup (64.5 g) Dutch-process cocoa powder
2 cups (250 g) all-purpose flour
2 cups (400 g) granulated sugar
1 ½ teaspoons baking soda
<sup>3</sup>⁄<sub>4</sub> teaspoons salt
2 eggs
<sup>3</sup>⁄<sub>3</sub> cup (153.33 ml) sour cream
For the whiskey ganache filling:
8 ounces bittersweet chocolate, finely chopped
<sup>2</sup>⁄<sub>3</sub> cup (158.67 ml) heavy cream

2 tablespoons butter, at room temperature

2 teaspoons Irish whiskey

### For the Bailey's frosting:

2 cups (454 g) unsalted butter, at room temperature

5 cups (600 g) powdered sugar

6 tablespoons Bailey's Irish Cream

<u>Make the cupcakes</u>: Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Line two standard muffin tins with liners.

Place the Guinness and butter in a medium saucepan and bring to a simmer over medium heat. Add the cocoa powder and whisk until the mixture is smooth. Remove from the heat and cool slightly.

In a medium bowl, whisk together the flour, sugar, baking soda, and salt; set aside.

Using an electric mixer, beat the eggs and sour cream on medium speed until combined. Add the Guinnesschocolate mixture to the egg mixture and beat just to combine. Reduce the speed to low, add the flour mixture and beat just until it starts to come together, about 30 seconds. Using a rubber spatula, fold the batter until completely combined. Divide the batter among the cupcake liners.

Bake until a thin knife inserted into the center comes out clean, about 17 minutes. Cool for 5 minutes in the pan, then remove the cupcakes to a wire rack to cool completely.

### GUINNESS, WHISKEY & IRISH CREAM CUPCAKES (Recipe continued from Page 6)

<u>Make the whiskey ganache filling</u>: Place the chocolate in a heatproof bowl. Place the heavy cream in a small saucepan and bring to simmer over medium heat. Immediately pour it over the chocolate, then let it sit for two minutes. Using a rubber spatula, gently stir the mixture from the center outward until smooth. Add the butter and whiskey and stir until combined. Let the ganache cool until thick but still soft enough to be piped, about 30 minutes. (If it becomes too stiff, simply give it a good whisk and it will loosen up.)

**Fill the cupcakes:** Using a paring knife, cut the centers out of the cooled cupcakes, going about two-thirds of the way down. Using a cookie scoop or spoon, divide the prepared ganache between the centers of the cupcakes.

<u>Make the Baileys frosting</u>: Using the whisk attachment of a stand mixer, whip the butter on medium-high speed for 5 minutes, scraping the sides of the bowl occasionally. Reduce the speed to medium-low and gradually add the powdered sugar until all of it is incorporated. Add the Baileys, increase the speed to medium-high and whip for another 2 to 3 minutes, until it is light and fluffy.

Using your favorite decorating tip, or an offset spatula, frost the cupcakes and decorate with sprinkles, if desired. Store the cupcakes in an airtight container at room temperature for up to 4 days.
