- Leave room for the new.
 - As you are collecting up the UFOs you may notice some projects on your mental wish list. A pattern you love but never have made, a book full of inspiration, or a stack of quilting magazines decorated with sticky notes marking must-make projects. Put hearts next to the UFOs based on how much you love them.
 - \circ Grab two or three new projects from your wish list.
- Schedule your UFOs.
 - You don't need to be in a hurry to get them all done at once. Instead, use the sorting piles to help you create a schedule to complete your projects.
 - $_{\odot}$ Select the project on your UFO list with the most hearts. Pencil it in your calendar to start first.
 - If it is a long term project, look for something from the Fast Finish pile to add to the week. Quick finishes keep us inspired!
 - If it is a project that will keep you at the sewing machine, pencil in a hand project for those hours in front of the TV or at the doctor's office.
 - Estimate how long it will take to finish the project with the most hearts and set a deadline; schedule the project with the second most hearts next.
 - Add a fast project and an alternate technique project to accompany it and stop.
 - Now pick something new. If you don't know what that is yet, set aside the time for something new.
 - $_{\odot}$ Work through your unfinished projects (alternating them with new) and fill up calendar.
- Once your projects are scheduled, put the projects-in-waiting away and get to work on the first UFO on the list.

Recipe Corner

ONE PAN CHICKEN WITH CREAMY NOODLES

3 garlic cloves, minced 2 cups heavy cream 4 boneless, skinless chicken breasts 2 tablespoons olive oil 8 oz egg noodles Salt and pepper, to taste 2 cups chicken broth 3 tablespoons butter ¹/₂ cup grated Parmesan cheese Fresh parsley, chopped (optional)

In a large skillet, heat the olive oil over medium heat. Season the chicken breasts generously with salt and pepper. Once the oil is hot, add the chicken to the skillet. Cook for about 5-6 minutes on each side until the chicken is golden brown and cooked through. Once done, remove the chicken from the skillet and set it aside on a plate.

In the same skillet, add the minced garlic and sauté for about 1 minute until fragrant. Pour in the chicken broth and heavy cream, bringing the mixture to a gentle simmer.

Stir in the egg noodles and cover the skillet. Allow the noodles to cook for about 8-10 minutes, or until they reach the desired tenderness. Stir occasionally to prevent sticking.

Once the noodles are cooked, reduce the heat to low. Add the butter and grated Parmesan cheese, stirring until both are melted and the sauce becomes creamy. Return the chicken to the skillet, allowing it to heat through for a couple of minutes. Serve; garnish with chopped parsley if desired.

SCOTT'S PICANTE PINEAPPLE CHICKEN

4-6 chicken breasts (with or without bones)

1 cup medium picante sauce (Recommend using Pace)

1 (15 oz.) can pineapple chunks (packed in fruit juice)

1/2 green pepper, thinly sliced

 $\frac{1}{2}$ onion, thinly sliced

Garlic powder

Salt

Pepper

Preheat oven to 350°F. Brown chicken breasts in skillet over medium heat for about 2 minutes on each side. Place chicken in shallow baking dish. Season with garlic powder, salt, and pepper.

Pour picante sauce over chicken; then pour pineapple chunks (with juice) over picante sauce. Arrange sliced green peppers and onions over top. Cover and bake for about 40 minutes. Serve over rice. Pineapple chunks can be omitted for a hotter recipe.

BUFFALO CHICKEN AND BLUE CHEESE DIP

4 boneless, skinless chicken breasts

16 oz. cream cheese

1 12-oz. bottle blue cheese dressing (Ranch can be used)

³/₄ cup hot sauce (Frank's is the best)

8 oz. sharp cheddar cheese, grated/shredded Salt and pepper

Preheat oven to 350°F. Boil chicken in large saucepan with just enough water to cover for 15-20 minutes. Remove chicken, pat dry and shred with fork. Place shredded chicken in large baking dish, pour hot sauce over chicken. Season with salt and pepper; set aside.

Over medium heat in a medium saucepan, melt cream cheese. Pour in blue cheese dressing, and stir until combined. Pour mixture over chicken and stir together.

Bake for 10 minutes. Remove and sprinkle cheddar cheese over the top. Return to oven for another 10-15 minutes until cheese is melted and starting to brown.

Serve hot or cold with chips, crackers, or bread, etc.

FOUR-CHEESE CHICKEN FETTUCINE

8 ounces uncooked fettuccine

1 can (10³/₄-oz) cream of mushroom soup, undiluted

1 package (8-oz) cream cheese, cubed

1 jar (4¹/₂-oz) sliced mushrooms, drained

1 cup heavy whipping cream

¹/₂ cup butter

1/4 teaspoon garlic powder

³/₄ cup grated Parmesan cheese

1/2 cup shredded part-skim mozzarella cheese

¹/₂ cup shredded Swiss cheese

 $2\frac{1}{2}$ cups cubed cooked chicken

For topping:

1/3 cup seasoned bread crumbs

2 tablespoons butter, melted

1 – 2 tablespoons grated Parmesan cheese

Cook fettuccine according to package directions.


In a large pot, combine soup, cream cheese, mushrooms, cream, butter and garlic powder. Stir in cheeses; cook and stir until melted. Add chicken; heat through. Drain fettuccine; add to the sauce.

Transfer to a shallow greased 2-1/2-qt. baking dish. Combine topping ingredients; sprinkle over chicken mixture. Cover and bake at 350° for 25 minutes. Uncover; bake 5-10 minutes longer or until golden brown.



2025 QOV BLOCK DRIVE





SUGGESTIONS FOR FINISHING A UFO

- Give it a name. Calling it by its name makes it more real. Give it a name instead of calling it names.
- Downsize the project if you can.
- Do the smallest task first. The feeling of accomplishment may help.
- Work only 15 minutes a day on your UFO. This allows you to reward yourself with working on your favorite projects.
- If you are lacking a skill, find someone in your family, bee, or guild who will help you with it.
- Trade or give it away to someone who will finish it.
- Make it fun! Make it a game, a challenge, a contest, a bet with a friend anything you can get into!



25th ANNIVERSARY SPRING QUILT SHOW IN ST ALBANS

The Franklin County Quilters Guild hosts its 25th Anniversary Quilt Show on Saturday, April 5th and Sunday, April 6th, 2025 in the St. Albans City Hall, 100 North Main Street. This event is FREE and open to the public. On Saturday the quilt show hours are 9:00AM to 4:00PM while on Sunday the doors will open at 10:00AM until 3:00PM.

The St. Albans City Hall will be filled with many beautiful quilts for display. In addition to viewing the many quilts show attendees can browse our Members' Boutique and take a chance on the guild's Raffle Quilt beautifully constructed by Laurel Schaap and long arm quilting by Diane Comeau of Cadi Corners LLC (See Attached Photo). On the street parking is available as well as a parking garage that can be accessed from either Lake or Federal Streets. The city's coffee shops, restaurants and stores are open on Saturday and have limited hours on Sunday.

There will also be a special quilt challenge, "Make It 25!" to commemorate the guild's 25th quilt show. Guild members have been asked to create a small quilt that depicts 25 or the quilt show or both. With many talented quilters this challenge will be something to come and see.

Throughout the day, guild members and vendors will provide demonstrations of various quilting techniques. Some of the quilts that members make and donate to charities such as Spectrum Youth, Visiting Nurse Association (VNA) & Hospice of the Southwest Region, fires and other disasters. The guild has donated thousands of quilts to charities and individuals since it was founded in 1991.

QUILTING TIPS FOR A NEW QUILTER

- Iron everything even if you think you don't need to. Your blocks will come out so much better if you do.
- If you're a new quilter, start small with a baby or lap quilt for your first quilt so you don't get overwhelmed.
- For your first quilt, make sure you really like the fabric you pick.
- Pick an easy pattern for your first quilt like squares maybe 5" or 6" to be sewn in a random pattern.
- Learn how to perfect a SCANT 1/4" seam. THIS IS A MUST.
- If you opt to pay a professional long arm to quilt your project, let her/him know you are new to the sport and need guidance. Follow their instructions exactly to be more successful.
- Label your fabric scissors as such and make it very clear to household they are to ONLY be used on fabric.
- Starch and press fabric before cutting makes it much easier to cut accurately.
- Finished is better than perfect.

<u>Maywood Studio</u>: Home of Kimberbell Basics and Shadow Play to name a few. They have a nice selection of free patterns to complement their beautiful fabrics and a tips section.

<u>Michael Miller Fabrics</u>: Many free patterns in all shapes and sizes to go along with their large collection of basics, novelty and contemporary collections.

<u>Moda Fabrics</u>: This company has grown into a powerhouse as they've moved into supplies and distribution as well as fabric manufacturing. Along with the free patterns page, you can find tons of precut patterns at the <u>Moda Bake Shop</u>.





<u>**Riley Blake Designs</u>**: This company is growing fast with a large group of designers creating contemporary collections along with traditional ones. They have a lot of free patterns including some sew alongs for a deeper dive into a project.</u>

<u>Shannon Fabrics</u>: This company is home to your favorite plush fabrics such as Cuddle (minky) and faux fur. Their free patterns include step-by-step instructions, fabric/notions requirements with images of the finished projects.
