Secretary's Report

Secretary's Report March 13, 2025

Greeting: President Cheryl Leach called meeting to order @ 6:30 pm. It's the first meeting after taking

January and February off. # **Present:** 37 attending

Visitors: 3 visitors – Sara, Pat, and Julie. Welcome back to Grace Sweet.

Birthdays: Birthday greetings to our January, February and March birthdays found in the newsletters.

Drawings: Just for Coming – Sara Huff (our visitor); Food Shelf – Hilda Tallman

Secretary's Report: Motion to accept the December minutes by Robin Wheel to accept, second by Jane Langdell; motion passed.

Treasurer's Report: Motion to accept the December to March treasurer's report by Robin Wheel, second by Jane Langdell; motion passed.

Sunshine Cards: Hilda Tallman reported that she sent out 2 cards since the last meeting.

Block of the Month: 46 blocks submitted of the red, white, and blue block. Instead of drawing for a winner, the quilts blocks will be used to make quilts for Quilts of Valor. We are still working out how to assemble the blocks; most likely we will have a work bee. New block – This is the same block as we did in December, the Lily Star, it is a 12.5" star to be done in red, white and blue.

New Business:

- The guild needs a new venue for our meetings, to house our library and shed storage. The storage building will be difficult to move so decisions need to be made about it. Sterling View is planning renovations to the hall so it will be under construction, the bathroom that the library is in is becoming an office and the rules around use make it challenging for the only 2 members in the park that are part of our guild. The move does not have to happen immediately but the guild needs to start the process.
 - o Andrea has looked into possible venues and one has looked promising at this point. It is the United Church of Johnson, but it would require we change the night of our meeting. There is plenty of the parking and space. They would consider using a quilt as partial or full payment for use.
 - o Other suggestions included the Crosby Center in Morrisville. That will be explored further. Other ideas such as the Hyde Park VFW are too costly to rent.
- Franklin County Quilt Show is the 1st weekend of April in St. Albans. Admission is free.

Program: A fabric you do not want to cut into and Sew and Tell combined with many items shared.

QUILTING TIPS

- Use a grapefruit spoon to help close quilting pins when basting a quilt sandwich
- A spring-loaded curtain rod between the sides of book cases can be used to store rolled up bindings.
- Irish Spring soap can help to reduce smell of older sewing machine and its case.
- Use empty square Kleenex boxes for trash next to your sewing machine.
- Use leftover cotton batting for removing nail polish instead of cotton balls. Works great!
- A picnic utensil holder works well for storing gadgets.
- A flannel backed table cover works well as a design wall.

Recipe Corner

CANDIED PECANS

½ cup granulated sugar

½ cup light brown sugar

1 tablespoon ground cinnamon

1 teaspoon salt

16 ounces unsalted pecans halves (about 4 cups)

1 large egg white

½ teaspoon vanilla extract

1 teaspoon water

Preheat oven to 300°F. Line a large baking sheet with parchment paper.

In a mixing bowl beat egg white, vanilla, and water until stiff peaks form. Add granulated sugar, brown sugar, cinnamon, and salt to a bowl and stir to combine.

Add pecans to the egg whites mixture and gently toss to coat. Add the cinnamon sugar mixture and stir gently until the pecans are well coated.

Spread the pecans into a single layer on the prepared baking sheet. Bake for about 40-45 minutes, stirring every 15 minutes. Remove from the oven and allow the pecans to cool completely on the baking sheet.

Store candied pecans in an airtight container at room temperature or in the refrigerator for several weeks.

SALTED PECAN SHORTBREAD SQUARES

For the crust:

1½ cups all-purpose flour

1 cup confectioners' sugar

½ cup cornstarch

1 teaspoon sea salt

1 cup cold unsalted butter, cubed

For the filling:

34 cup unsalted butter, cubed

1½ cups packed brown sugar

½ cup dark maple syrup

½ teaspoon sea salt

½ cup milk chocolate chips

1/4 cup heavy whipping cream

1 teaspoon vanilla extract

4 cups coarsely chopped pecans, toasted

Preheat oven to 350°F. Line two 13x9-in. baking pans with foil, letting ends extend up sides of pan.

For the crust:

Place flour, confectioners' sugar, cornstarch and salt in a food processor; pulse until blended. Add butter; pulse until butter is the size of peas. Divide mixture between prepared pans; press onto bottom of pans. Bake 10-12 minutes or until light brown. Cool on a wire rack.

For the filling:

Melt butter in a large saucepan. Stir in brown sugar, corn syrup and salt; bring to a boil. Reduce heat to medium; cook and stir until sugar is completely dissolved, about 3 minutes. Remove from heat; stir in chocolate chips, cream and vanilla until smooth. Stir in pecans. Spread over crusts.

Bake 12-15 minutes or until filling is bubbly. Cool completely in pans on wire racks. Using foil, lift the shortbread out of pans. Gently peel off foil; cut each shortbread into 24 bars. Store in an airtight container.

BUTTERSCOTCH PECAN BREAD PUDDING

9 cups cubed day-old white bread (about 8 slices)

½ cup chopped pecans

½ cup butterscotch chips

4 large eggs

2 cups half-and-half cream

½ cup packed brown sugar

½ cup butter, melted

1 teaspoon vanilla extract

Whipped cream and butterscotch ice cream topping

Place bread, pecans and butterscotch chips in a greased 4-qt. slow cooker. In a large bowl, whisk eggs, cream, brown sugar, melted butter and vanilla until blended. Pour over bread mixture; stir gently to combine.

Cook, covered, on low until a knife inserted in center comes out clean, 3-4 hours. Serve warm with whipped cream and butterscotch topping.

SAVORY SPICED PECANS

4 cups (1 pound) pecans halves

⅓ cup (5⅓ tablespoons) unsalted butter, melted

2 teaspoons Worcestershire sauce

11/4 teaspoons kosher salt

½ teaspoon garlic powder

½ teaspoon ground mustard

½ teaspoon Tabasco sauce, or to taste

 $\frac{1}{4}$ teaspoon cayenne pepper, or to taste

Preheat oven to 300°F. Place pecans in large mixing bowl. In another bowl, whisk together melted butter, Worcestershire sauce, salt, garlic powder, ground mustard, Tabasco, and cayenne. Pour the butter mixture over the pecans and stir until well combined. Taste; add more Tabasco or cayenne if desired.

Arrange pecans on large sheet pan; bake for 20-22 minutes until toasted and lightly browned, stirring halfway cooking time to prevent burning. Remove from oven and cool completely, tossing occasionally, before transferring to an airtight container.

QUILTING TIPS

- Share your quilting projects with everyone you know. You never know when someone (usually the person you least expect) will become interested in quilting and want to learn this wonderful craft.
- Glue small pieces of sandpaper on the backs of your rulers to keep them from slipping on the fabric when rotary cutting.
- When making quilts for children, family or friends, add a secret pocket with a little love note in it...only you and the recipient will know where it is if you disguise it well.
- Stay-stitch any bias edges of blocks before assembling blocks into quilt top. This prevents stretching.
- While traveling, use a tooth floss container to cut your thread.
