



Hi Everyone,


It's beginning to look a lot like spring has finally sprung! Everything greened up overnight with all the rain and flowers are popping.

QUILT TIPS

- Whenever you draft an original pattern or make changes in an existing pattern, always work without seam allowances. Figure the math (or drawings) on your borders, blocks or whatever first, then add the seam allowances. This will minimize confusion and lets you concentrate on design.
- When piecing by machine, use a thread of slightly darker color in the bobbin. Doing this will make your "reverse sewing" (if necessary) easier.
- Glue small pieces of sandpaper on the backs of your rulers to keep them from slipping on the fabric when rotary cutting.
- Keep your old rotary cutter and mat if you buy a new one. Use the old one to cut paper patterns, photos or other craft things.
- Rubberized shelf protectors prevent your sewing machine foot pedal from slipping all over the place. Cut a piece larger than your foot pedal and place it underneath the foot pedal. Also, if your sewing machine "walks" across your table, this product will help.
- When you finish making a quilt, use the scrap fabrics to make a "pillow case" for the quilt to be stored in. You can also make a zipper closing so the quilt can't escape. The zippered case acts as a dust cover, and the scrap fabrics help identify what's inside. If the quilt should need repairs, the fabric from the dust cover can be used.

She gave us the following information: "What you need: One jelly roll or 40 2 ½" strips x WOF (or the equivalent). 2 ½" batting strips – I use Warm and Natural and cup up scrap as I finish quilts; Jelly Roll Rug Pattern by RJ Designs: you can find it on Etsy – lots of great tips; Jelly Roll Tube Maker by Gypsy Quilter – optional, but very helpful; Thread – I use Superior thread So Fine #409 (med. Grey)."

Recipe Corner

STRAWBERRY JELLO PRETZEL SALAD

1 ¼ cup sugar
 2 cups crushed pretzels
 ¾ cup melted unsalted butter
 8 oz. softened cream cheese
 8 oz. tub of whipped topping, thawed
 6 oz. package strawberry gelatin
 2 cups heated pineapple juice
 10 oz. sliced frozen strawberries (thawed)

Stir pretzels, ¼ cup sugar, and butter together in a 9x13 baking dish. Bake for 10 minutes at 350 degrees. Remove from oven and cool completely.

Prepare Jell-O according to directions, substituting hot pineapple juice for hot water, and add the strawberries right before chilling. Refrigerate until partially set.

Beat cream cheese and 1 cup of sugar together until smooth. Fold in the thawed whipped topping. Spread over the cooled pretzel crust.

When the Jell-O is cool and partially set, pour it over the cream cheese layer. Chill before serving.

Notes: If you can't get tubs of whipping cream or prefer to make your own, use a mixer with a whisk attachment to beat 1 cup of heavy whipping cream until soft/medium peaks form. You can heat the pineapple juice in a saucepan on the stove, or place it in a glass measuring cup and heat it in the microwave.

SCOTT'S STRAWBERRY DAIQUIRIS

1 (6-oz.) can frozen limeade concentrate
 8 oz. frozen strawberries
 6 oz. rum
 1 teaspoon sugar
 Water
 Lime
 Sugar for garnish
 Fresh strawberries for garnish

In a blender, mix together limeade, strawberries, rum and sugar. Blend on high. Add water as needed. Cut lime into wedges. Run wedge along rim of glass. Dip rim into sugar. Pour daiquiri into glass. Garnish with fresh strawberry and/or lime wedge.

SPINACH – STRAWBERRY SALAD

Pecans:

2 tablespoons butter

1 ½ cups pecan halves
 ½ cup sugar

Melt butter and sugar in heavy skillet, stir in pecans and cook until coated and browned slightly. Watch closely as the mixture burns easily. Cool on waxed paper or foil.

Dressing:

⅔ cup white vinegar
 ½ cup sugar
 2 tsp. salt
 2 tsp. mustard (I used Dijon)
 3-4 scallions chopped
 2 c. Veggie oil
 2 tsp. poppy seeds

Whisk ingredients together.

Salad:

1 pound fresh spinach, washed and thick stems removed, then torn
 2 cups sliced celery
 1 pint fresh strawberries, hulled and sliced

Assemble salad. Dress salad and add pecans at last minute.

Note: Dressing recipe makes too much for salad, so add dressing to taste.

MORE QUILT TIPS

- Share your quilting projects with everyone you know. You never know when someone (usually the person you least expect) will become interested in quilting and want to learn.
- Glue small pieces of sandpaper on the backs of your rulers to keep them from slipping on the fabric when rotary cutting.
- It's easier to make half-square triangles slightly larger size than the finished requirement, and then square them to size.
- Keep a small empty tissue box (the square ones) on your cutting table for a tabletop wastepaper basket. It's perfect for small pieces of thread, etc.
- Keep an extension cord in your traveling sewing machine case. You never know if you'll need one when you go to a class or a friend's house to sew.
- To make it easier to remove papers from foundation-pieced projects, run the handle end of a pair of scissors along each stitching line to weaken the paper.
- She who has the most wins! The most important tool for quilting is your fabric collection. Build a good stash and then you'll always be able to find that special piece you need to complete a project.

Dust If You Must

Dust if you must, but wouldn't it be better
To paint a picture, or write a letter,
Bake a cake, or plant a seed;
Ponder the difference between want and need?

Dust if you must, but there's not much time,
With rivers to swim, and mountains to climb;
Music to hear and books to read;
Friends to cherish and life to lead.

With the sun in your eyes, and the wind in your hair;
A flutter of snow, a shower of rain,

You, yourself, will make more dust.

AND EVEN MORE QUILT TIPS

- Keep some alcohol prep pads in your sewing box and near your sewing machine. They're great if you jab yourself with a needle. You can also use them to clean your needle when it gets sticky from fusibles or glue.
- Before starting a new quilt, transfer the cutting instructions to a dry erase board. As you cut, erase that size and move on. It's easier than looking at the instructions in the magazine.
- Cut your practice pieces for machine quilting into circles and zigzag the edges. You can use the circles as protection between pieces of china when stacking them.
- To get the perspective of distance on a quilt plan, view it through a door peephole insert from the hardware store.
- Cut the background fabric block for redwork or appliqué 1" larger than the desired finished block size. This will allow for "shrinkage" while you work.
- Pin appliqué elements to the background fabric from the back instead of the front. The thread will be less likely to catch on the pins.
- Recycle flexible plastic cutting boards for the bottoms of handmade bags. Cover the plastic with a layer of batting for padding and a fabric sleeve.
- When safety pin basting, use a crochet hook or a grapefruit spoon to help catch the points of the pins as they emerge from under the quilt.
