PROGRAMS IDEAS

- Potholder swap at ice cream social
- Featherweight Fair/Vintage sewing machines
- Strip Poker
- Zentangle and Zentangle quilting
- Birthday blocks
- Strategies and encouragement to finish UFOs
- Ask members to introduce themselves, tell how they began quilting, and show an early project and/or a current project, finished or not.
- Have someone give a presentation on the use of the color wheel to help choose fabrics.
- Demonstrate how to resize any block.
- Show a video or slides of a recent quilt show, local or otherwise.
- Have a style show of members' quilted garments.

- Talk about how to use the internet to enhance your quilting.
- Ask a local shop owner to: bring her/his wares to demo or sell; talk about going to market; or tell how she determines which fabric and notions to buy, from whom, how much, etc.
- Have an exchange of UFOs or unwanted or unneeded notions.
- Have a theme night first quilt, worst quilt, children's quilt, feed sack quilt, antique quilt, 30's fabric quilt, etc.
- Have a "Trash or Treasure Night", a yard sale for quilters.
- Have members bring their favorite quilting book and tell why it's their favorite.
- Talk on good books for quilt history and research.

Recipe Corner

GLAZED APPLE-MAPLE BLONDIES

1 1/3 cups packed brown sugar
½ cup butter, melted and cooled
½ cup maple syrup
2 teaspoons vanilla extract
2 large eggs, room temperature
2 cups all-purpose flour
¾ teaspoon salt
¼ teaspoon baking soda
3 cups chopped peeled apples (3 medium)
GLAZE:
¼ cup butter, cubed
½ cup maple syrup

1/4 cup packed brown sugar

Preheat oven to 350°. Line a 13"x9" baking pan with parchment paper, letting ends extend up sides.

In a large bowl, beat brown sugar, melted butter, syrup and vanilla until blended. Beat in eggs. In another bowl, whisk flour, salt and baking soda; gradually beat into brown sugar mixture. Stir in apples (batter will be thick).

Transfer to prepared pan. Bake 25-30 minutes or until golden brown and a toothpick inserted in center comes out with moist crumbs.

Meanwhile, in a small saucepan, melt butter over medium-low heat; stir in syrup and brown sugar. Bring to a boil over medium heat; cook and stir 2-3 minutes or until slightly thickened. Remove from heat; cool slightly.

Pour glaze over warm blondies. Cool completely in pan on a wire rack. Cut into bars.

CARAMEL APPLE SCONES

1 cup all-purpose flour

- 2 tablespoons brown sugar
- 1½ teaspoons baking powder

¼ teaspoon salt

- **3 tablespoons cold butter**
- 1/4 cup plus 2 tablespoons half-and-half
- 1 large egg yolk
- 1 ½ teaspoons vanilla extract
- 2/3 cup shredded peeled apple
- 1 tablespoon caramel ice cream topping

In a small bowl, combine the flours, brown sugar, baking powder and salt. Cut in butter until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. In a small bowl, whisk the cream, egg yolk and vanilla; add to dry ingredients just until moistened. Stir in apple. Turn onto a floured surface; knead 10 times.

Pat into a 5-in. circle. Cut into 4 wedges. Separate wedges and place on an ungreased baking sheet. Bake at 400° for 15-20 minutes or until golden brown. Cool for 10 minutes. Drizzle with caramel topping.

APPLE KUCHEN BARS

3 cups all-purpose flour, divided
¼ teaspoon salt
1½ cups cold butter, divided
4 to 5 tablespoons ice water
8 cups thinly sliced peeled tart apples
2 cups sugar, divided
2 teaspoons ground cinnamon
Preheat oven to 350°. Place 2 cups flour and

salt in a food processor; pulse until blended. Add 1 cup butter; pulse until butter is the size of peas. While pulsing, add just enough ice water to form moist crumbs.

Press mixture onto bottom of a greased 13"x9" baking pan. Bake until edges are lightly browned, 20-25 minutes. Cool on a wire rack.

In a large bowl, combine apples, 1 cup sugar and cinnamon; toss to coat. Spoon over crust. Place remaining flour, butter and sugar in food processor; pulse until coarse crumbs form. Sprinkle over apples. Bake until golden brown and apples are tender, about 60-70 minutes. Cool completely on a wire rack. Cut into bars.

- Invite a lawyer to talk about copyright laws and how those laws apply to quilts and quilt making.

- Divide the guild into groups of 10, giving each group a paper and pencil and a first (preferably wild and whacky) line to a story. Each group incorporates as many different quilt block names as possible in writing its story. Prizes are given for the most improbable, the greatest # of block names used, etc.
- Set up several stations with a demonstration at each (flying geese, prairie points, hand quilting, chain piecing, basting, marking, hand and machine applique, embellishing, half and quartersquare triangles, rotary cutting, etc.); members are divided into as many groups as there are demos and rotate to the different stations every 10 minutes.
- Have a professional longarmer share tips on preparing your quilt top, backing, and batting for longarm quilting and pricing for longarm quilting.
- Have a fabric swap. Every person gets a "ticket" for the number of yards they bring in. Members take turns going to the table piled with fabric and making their selection.
- UFO auction of members' "unwanted" UFOs.

BELKNAP MILL QUILTERS GUILD 44TH ANNUAL OUILT SHOW AND MYSTERIOUS QUILT JOURNEY

You are invited to view a kaleidoscope of color along the streets of and in three buildings in downtown Laconia, NH, September 25th and 26th, during the Belknap Mill Quilters Guild 44th Annual Quilt Show and Mysterious Quilt Journey.

As you walk or drive along from one display venue to another, you have a chance to experience a Mysterious Quilt Journey with beautiful quilted works of art on display at various businesses that have been matched up to represent their business. When you arrive at one of the three venues you will find over 200 quilts and many works of art on display. You may begin your journey, in Laconia, at any one of the venues: Belknap Mill, 25 Beacon Street; Laconia Housing, 32 Canal Street; or The Conference Center on Main Street. Admission includes all locations, \$10.00 Adult and children under 12 free with a paid adult admission.

The quilted works of art vary from the traditional or modern quilt patterns in many different categories ranging from bed quilts to wall art work, machine embroidered, wearable, a special category for Juniors, under the age of 16, and a featured special exhibit for first time quilters! There is something for everyone to view.

A raffle quilt made by guild members will be on display. Tickets are available the day of the show. The drawing will take place on Sunday, and you do not need to be present to win. Tickets are \$1.00 each or 5 for \$6.00.

Two very popular booths, Attic Corner and Quilted Treasurers, will once again be available for visitors. Attic Corner has donated items, tools, books, fabric, and much more, that members have found that they no longer need. Quilted Treasurers has a multitude of handmade finished products that showcase the talents of our members.

The quilt show is more than a chance to display works of art, it is also a chance for guild members to engage with other quilters to share their passions and inspire each other to start the next project, or finish their UFOs. (Shh....when quilters talk about UFOs they are referring to their unfinished objects, partially sewn quilts and blocks that seemed to have accumulated.)

There will be vendors set up at the various venues with a vast range of merchandise for sale. Anything from sewing machines and longarm machines, to fabric, patterns and needles can be found along with finished products.



The show is run entirely by volunteers from the guild and is the guild's only fundraiser which supports the many community-based projects and allows the BMQG to give back. In addition to providing financial support to local food pantries, the Lakes Region Scholarship Foundation, Salvation Army, and St. Vincent de Paul, guild members contribute to the community. Members volunteer to produce quilts, placemats, and masks for many different organizations throughout the Lakes Region.
